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Every student would be required to sign a declaration upon admission attesting to their agreement to abide by the specified codes and verifying their pledges to:

- Any kind of prejudice, whether physical or verbal, against someone because of their gender identity, caste, ethnicity, religion, or religious beliefs; color, region, language; handicap; marriage or family status; or physical or mental impairment, among other reasons.
- ➤ On college campuses, students are expected to maintain the greatest standards of decorum and discipline.
- ➤ Raiding and other anti-institutional, anti-national, antisocial, communal, immoral, or political speech or actions are completely prohibited on campus and in dorms. Violations will result in consequences.
- ➤ There will be consequences for any harm or destruction done to the College's or any other property on the grounds. A committee has been established to investigate any potential violations of the previously established expectations of behavior on the part of the students.
- It is each student's duty to keep the campus, especially the labs, usually clean.
- > The student is required to finish all of the courses offered by the college and to attend classes consistently.
- ➤ When on college property, all students need to have their identity cards with them.
- > Smoking, chewing tobacco, and using any other type of intoxicating substance are strictly prohibited.
- ➤ Engaging in any behavior that impedes the college's ability to conduct research, educate, or administer policies is likewise prohibited.
- ➤ It is strictly forbidden to play cards, spit, or loiter on college and dorm campuses. Violators will be subject to harsh penalties and disciplinary punishment. Additionally, using a cell phone in class is not permitted at all.

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

Right Conduct: comprises ethical principles such as responsibility, courage, initiative, independence, and effectiveness. It also includes self-help ideas like independence, modesty, and



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hygiene.

- ♣ Peace: Among other qualities, peace is defined by equality, modesty, optimism, patience, self-assurance, self-control, and self-worth. Its scope includes global, societal, and individual peace in addition to international peace.
- **↓** Truth: Truth deals with the ultimate and unchangeable reality and is eternal and unchanging. It is certified by traits such as truthfulness, impartiality, courage, integrity, persistence, and the pursuit of knowledge.

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CHAPTER II PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT CODE





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NEED FOR PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

Professional ethics and human values are related. Human values convey a person's own opinion, whereas ethical standards serve as the generally recognized norms for moral behavior concerning obligations and virtues in relation to an organization. Codes of professional ethics educate an organization's stakeholders about appropriate and inappropriate behavior in a given field.

Enforcing conformity to a solid, accepted code of ethics is the fundamental tenet of professional ethics. The committed instructors, administrators, employees, and students of a particular institution make its goals and vision possible because they act honorably and with integrity. The codes of conduct of such professional organizations must contain the following essential elements of professional ethics.

- **♣ Inclusivity:** putting in place policies, procedures, and guidelines to ensure that no one is subjected to discrimination when looking for a position, a promotion, or other opportunities within a corporation.
- **Commitment:** obtaining the abilities, know-how, and dispositions necessary to achieve greatness while abiding by the law and committing oneself to the mission and vision of the organization.
- **Trusteeship**: managing the organization's affairs in an effective, moral, and truthful way while promoting member collaboration and a system of checks and balances.
- **Harmony:** Stakeholders should foster an atmosphere of forgiveness, open communication, and tolerance in order to strike a balance between diversity and difference.
- **↓ Integrity:** doing one's obligations in a morally appropriate manner, which entails being truthful, dependable, open, and equitable.
- **Respectfulness:** Encouraging a culture of dependability, excellent communication, and trust while ensuring that the institution's employees and beneficiaries are equally involved.
- ♣ Accountability: fostering an atmosphere of transparency and trust that allows people to make mistakes and encourages them to take responsibility for their actions.
- ♣ Sustainability: Making the greatest use of available social, financial, and environmental resources to build a long-lasting and stable future.





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Social Ethics and professional Conduct

Professionals are held to higher standards of conduct because of the faith that the public, colleagues, and clients place in them, regardless of their field—medicine, law, engineering, or business administration. Upholding the values of integrity and responsibility, adhering to industry laws, being competent in one's sector, and obeying codes of ethics are all examples of professional behavior.

The cornerstones of ethical behavior in society are professional conduct and human ethics combined. They offer standards by which people and institutions can act morally and behave in a fair, honest, and courteous way toward others. Following these guidelines promotes good relationships, increases credibility and trust, and helps create a society that is just and peaceful.

Ethical behavior is especially crucial in professional contexts since it can have a big impact on stakeholders, clients, and the general public. For instance, trust between patients and healthcare practitioners is largely dependent on adherence to ethical standards in the medical sector, such as informed consent, patient confidentiality, and beneficence (working in the patient's best interest).

Social ethics and professional conduct influence institutional policies and procedures in addition to directing individual behavior. A lot of companies have codes of conduct or ethics that describe what is expected of their workers and how to handle unethical situations or misbehavior. Organizations can create a work environment where employees feel appreciated, respected, and inspired to follow moral norms by cultivating a culture of ethics and integrity.

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CODES OF PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

Administrative Authority

Chairperson, Honorary Secretary, Dean Academic Affairs, Dean Students' Welfare, Registrar, Proctor, Deans of several faculties, Department Heads, etc. would be among them.

The authority would:

- ♣ Assume accountability for making sure that all facets of the College's operations are conducted in a manner that strictly complies with all applicable laws, regulations, and policies.
- ♣ Comply with all laws, guidelines, and directives issued by the appropriate authorities.
- ♣ Maintain the privacy of sensitive information, including records.
- ♣ Make an effort to foster a work atmosphere with moral standards that value quality, professionalism, and contentment.
- Avoid misusing any type of resource, even non-monetary ones.
- ♣ Encourage academic and executive leadership in the fields of operational management, sustainability and environmental issues, policy formation, and human resource optimization.
- ♣ Always consider the highest moral standards while making choices that are best for the College.
- ♣ Provide an atmosphere that, to the best of the university's abilities, encourages research, development, teaching, and learning with the goal of advancing social change and, ultimately, national progress.
- ♣ Respect the College's policies and goals and make a positive contribution to their accomplishment.

Administrative Staff

Administrative staff would:

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government.

- Preserve the confidentiality of private data, including documents.
- **↓** Cooperate and form close relationships with coworkers.
- ♣ Refuse to take bribes or participate in any corrupt activities.
- Make every effort to do the given task by the due date.

The Teachers

Students and members of the public are continuously observing teachers. Instilling information and ideals in students is the noble and devoted profession of teaching. His or her actions and views should support competence, excellence, and idealism. Consequently, it is imperative for all educators to make sure that their beliefs and behaviors are in harmony. He or she is responsible for upholding the previously defined national education ideals, which they should endeavor to teach in the children. Professional criteria also state that teachers need to have a friendly demeanor and a calm, patient, communicative temperament.

Teachers would:

- ♣ Make an effort to improve education and the moral and intellectual life of the community.
- ♣ Take part in and lend assistance to the College's processes for admission, supervision, assessment, invigilation, and evaluation.
- Treat their private affairs with the decency befitting their profession.
- Make an attempt to consistently progress professionally via research and study.
- ♣ Complete tasks set by the institution in the form of teaching, tutorials, practicals, seminars, and research projects with dedication, devotion, and punctuality.
- Continue to be an active member of professional associations and use them to further the profession and education.
- ♣ Participate in professional gatherings, seminars, conferences, etc. to share knowledge and freely express your thoughts.
- Engage in co-curricular, extracurricular, and extension activities including volunteer work in the community.
- Honor the dignity and right of every kid to express their thoughts. Regardless of a student's physical characteristics, political affiliation, social class, or religion, treat them all equally and impartially.
- Reorganize students' diverse abilities and capacities while attempting to meet their individual needs.
- ♣ Be kind to the students and abstain from acting resentfully toward any of them for any reason.
- ♣ Only consider a student's accomplishments when assessing their value.
- ♣ Encourage professional growth through conducting continuing research and presenting at conferences, seminars, and inclustry get-togethers.
 PRINCIPAL

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- ♣ Cooperate with the government to enhance the establishments while respecting the rights and interests of the profession.
- Honor the conditions of the agreement; recognize that education is a public good and endeavor to educate the public about the programs being provided; and assist the College in formulating its policies by assuming a variety of roles and performing any tasks that may be delegated to them.
- Respect the College's cultural practices, traditions, vision, and ideals, as well as its acts, statutes, ordinances, rules, policies, and procedures.
- ♣ Adhere to the moral principles and behavior that are expected of them by society.
- ♣ Create a positive teaching and learning environment by utilizing innovative methods and information sharing.
- Treat other professionals with the respect they deserve by acting in their best interests. Take action to amend any regulations that are detrimental to the professional interest through their respective institutional bodies and/or professional associations. They should also carry out their professional duties in compliance with the laws as they stand and adhere to the protocols and practices that are suitable for their line of work.
- ♣ Refrain from accepting any positions or responsibilities, such as one-on-one coaching or tutoring, that might clash with their professional duties.
- ♣ Provide a model of moral rectitude and excellent behavior for the students.
- ♣ By becoming friends, mentors, and philosophers, help students reach their full potential and develop their personalities and contributions to the environment, national heritage, and communal welfare.
- Encourage students to participate actively in initiatives that are national priorities.
- Refrain from mistreating students in any way.
- 4 Show respect for other educators and provide assistance with their professional growth.
- 4 Apply unbiased and equitable treatment to students, considering their caste, absence of religion, and other social, political, and physical characteristics.
- Refrain from taking on any additional work or responsibilities, such as private coaching or tutoring sessions, that might interfere with their professional duties.

The Students

At the time of admission, each student would have to sign a declaration confirming that they would follow the rules as stated. This declaration would attest to their promise to refrain from any physical or verbal discrimination against anyone based on their gender identity, caste, race, religion, or religious beliefs, color, region, language, disability, marital or family status, physical





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or mental disability, etc. Additionally, students would have to uphold the highest standards of discipline and dignified behavior on college campuses.

It is highly illegal and penalized to engage in ragging, anti-institutional, anti-national, antisocial, communal, immoral, or political expressions and activities within the campus and hostel. It is also punishable to damage or destroy any other property owned by the College or any other location on the property. A committee has been established to investigate any potential violations of the previously established expectations of behavior on the part of the students. It is the responsibility of every student to keep the campus, labs, and classrooms generally clean.

On campus or in the dorm, ragging and other anti-institutional, anti-national, antisocial, communal, immoral, or political speech or actions are absolutely prohibited and punishable by law.

- ♣ There will be consequences for any harm or destruction done to the College's or any other property on the grounds. A committee has been established to investigate any potential violations of the previously established expectations of behavior on the part of the students.
- ♣ Students must finish all of their courses at the college and attend regularly;
- ≠ Students are responsible for keeping the campus, including the labs, generally clean.
- ➡ It is strictly forbidden to take any action that obstructs the college's ability to conduct research, teach, or administer operations.
- ♣ Spitting, playing cards, and loitering are absolutely forbidden on college and dorm campuses. Smoking, chewing tobacco, and the use of any other intoxicating substances are also forbidden. Serious fines or disciplinary action will follow violations of this policy.
- There will be repercussions for attempting to steal from, destroy, or damage College property, community member property, or any other kind of private or public property, whether on or off campus. Using a cell phone in class is strictly forbidden. Students are expected to take full use of the library and to take care of the college property in their free time.
- ♣ A fine or suspension from the institution may be imposed if any furniture or other materials are harmed.
- ♣ In the event that a student leaves college early, they are accountable for fulfilling all unpaid debts and forfeiting any scholarships they may have won.
- → The College is committed to upholding standards of behavior to foster a secure and productive atmosphere. It is required of all students to maintain academic integrity.
- **♣** Students are encouraged to spend as much time as they cannot be library during their free time.

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- ♣ Using a vehicle (a bicycle, two-wheeler, four-wheeler, etc.) in a spot designated for someone other than a student or one that is not intended for parking.) driving carelessly on campus, which can aggravate fellow pupils.
- ♣ Keeping a physical or mental health condition a secret that would have hindered the student's academic achievement; stealing or utilizing another person's property without authorization.
- ➡ Without authorization from the college's officials, students are not permitted to host reporters on campus or take part in media relations on the college's behalf.
- ♣ Students should use caution, responsibility, and self-control when using social media.
- ♣ Students are not allowed to distribute audio and video clips of any campus activity to print or electronic media without prior authorization.
- ♣ Students are not allowed to record lectures in class—either on audio or video—or the actions of staff members, instructors, or other students without permission.
- ➡ Without permission from the principal, students are not allowed to distribute any printed materials on the college campus.
- ↓ Latecomers will not be permitted to into the classroom.
- 4 A student must maintain a minimum of 75% attendance in all academic lectures in addition to 100% overall performance.
- ≠ Failure to do so will result in the individual being excluded from the university examination.

Our students are constantly educated and imbued with the fundamental ethical ideals of independence, avoiding harm to others, supporting everyone, fairness, and honesty. Universal brotherhood, the development of self-confidence, an open mind to assist the poor and in need, empathy for the downtrodden, and a willingness to offer assistance are among the key principles that are upheld on campus.

Early on in their education, young students should be taught professional ethics to assist them avoid the increasingly dirty business environment to which they are exposed. Professional ethics is a requirement that cannot be avoided and should be engrained in their brains deeply.

1. Independence Day - Independence Day in India is celebrated on August 15 every year, commemorating the nation's freedom from British rule in 1947.
